G20 Summit 2023: Member Nations, Leaders, **Agenda, And Schedule**

The Group of Twenty (G20) is an climate change, sustainable energy, intergovernmental organization made up of 19 countries plus the European Union (EU). The G20 was formed in 1999 in response to global economic difficulties, and it has since played an important role in tackling significant global economic challenges. It is made up of finance ministers from some of the world's greatest economies, representing roughly 80% of global GDP, 75% of international commerce, and two-thirds of the world's population.

G20 has expanded on topics from economics and finance, including

debt relief, and multinational corporation taxation. For the G20 2023 Summit, the discussions would revolve around: increasing loans to developing nations from multilateral institutions, reforming international debt structures, regulating cryptocurrencies and addressing the of impact geopolitical uncertainties on food and energy security.





A G20 Leaders' Declaration was be adopted at the conclusion of the G20 Summit, stating Leaders' commitment towards the priorities discussed and agreed upon during the respective ministerial and working group meetings. In addition to the regular International Organisations (UN, IMF, WB, WHO, WTO, ILO, FSB and OECD) and Chairs of Regional Organisations (AU, AUDA-NEPAD and ASEAN), India, as G20 Presidency, would be inviting ISA, CDRI and ADB as Guest Ios.

Hangzhou Asian Games Opens with a Futuristic Ceremony



The Hangzhou Asian Games began on Saturday with a really unusual opening ceremony, including a spectacular futuristic light show as its centerpiece, blending the realms of artificial intelligence with ecofriendly technology. The compelling show ingeniously integrated elements of technology, China's rich cultural history, and the sense of oneness across the continent.

Around 11,000 athletes competed in the Tokyo Olympics two years ago, and roughly 10,500 will compete in the Paris Games next year. The 2018 Asian Games featured slightly more than 11,000 athletes, which will be surpassed in Hangzhou.

India's Rich and Diverse Languages

India is a land of linguistic diversity, with over 780 languages spoken across its 28 states and 8 union territories. According to the Indian Constitution, there are 22 official languages, each with its own alphabet, literature, and cultural history. With over 44% of the population speaking Hindi as their first or second language, Hindi is the most widely spoken language. Hindi got its name from the Persian word Hind, meaning 'land of the Indus River'. Bengali is also one of the most spoken languages in the world.

English is the second language in India, and the reason why stems from history. English was the official language during British rule. When India was granted independence, the language lingered, and time hasn't changed that.

In keeping with the major topic of 'Tides Surging in Asia,' the ceremony focused on the new era's intertwining of China, Asia, and the world, as well as the Asian people's togetherness, love, and friendship. The lighting of the cauldron - the Games' Flame -- was done in an unusual manner, demonstrating China's technological might.

The 19th edition of the continental showpiece will be hosted in five cities, including Huzhou, Ningbo, Shaoxing, Jinhua, and Wenzhou.

Asia's 45 nations and territories will fight for 481 gold medals across 41 sports and 61 disciplines, including Esports, which will make its Games debut. Football, volleyball, cricket, rowing, sailing, and modern pentathlon competitions began before to Saturday's opening ceremony.

In fact, India is ranked as the world's second-largest English-speaking country after the United States, with over 1 billion people speaking it.

Hindi is the official language of India, with English being the second official language. However, there is no national language as per the Constitution.

Other prominent languages with more than 25 million speakers include Bengali, Telugu, Marathi, Tamil, Urdu, Gujarati, Kannada, Malayalam, Odia, and Punjabi. Some of the languages have ancient origins, such as Sanskrit, Tamil, and Prakrit, while others, such as Persian, Arabic, Portuguese, and English, have evolved from numerous influences.

The word "Goodbye" originally comes from an Old English phrase meaning "god be with you".



Q. The NEP 2020 is a bold step that aims to empower students to pursue careers they are passionate about. How exactly will the NEP 2020 make it easier for students to follow their passion and choose a career path that aligns with their interests, sir? What should the parameters for selecting a career be- skill or interest?

Mr Emanuel: Schools and parents must give students an opportunity to choose subjects they are interested in. There should not be any compulsion in choosing their subjects. If you look at the school level, there are a lot of subjects available, including music, dance and the likes. The problem is at the higher education level. If the subject does not have much scope, no one will choose it. There is a need for a minimum number of students for each course to prevent segregation of subjects. That is how NEP 2020 aims to promote subjects that allow students to follow their passion.





Q. The education system is undergoing a tremendous change. The credit-based system introduced by the NEP 2020 has the potential to offer students more flexibility. Can you explain the need of the same in the present day scenario and how the system will help the students in pursuing their academic goals, sir?

Mr Emanuel: Currently, a strict bifurcation between the classes exists. In the times to come, a point grading scale will be followed. A numerical point will be allotted to each grade. As a student completes a class or a course, a numerical value will be added, and this grade will tell the capacity of the person. The score of each person is stored at a digital 'bank', which gives this system its name of a 'credit system'.

Q. NEP is a commendable initiative that aims to make the students future ready. As technology continues to advance, what skills do you believe will be most valuable for students to develop in order to thrive in the future job market, sir?

Mr Emanuel: I believe that up to the Senior Secondary level, till the time you are in school, you must be an all-rounder. All aspects of your education are equally important till this level. After that, for further studies, you should take your skills and interests into account. Your capabilities are important for selection of a career. You must also look at its scope for employability and growth in that particular sector in times to come.


Q. How will the NEP 2020 facilitate a seamless transition for students from school to college and eventually into the workforce? What are three golden rules for a student undergoing this transition?

Mr Emanuel: The present challenge is that the graduates are not employed. Higher education says that the school children do not have the required capability for their courses. The focus is on creating a shift in the schooling of students to promote skills that allow them to pursue optimum graduation and post-graduation courses. You must choose your career according to the job market. Money does matter. In the coming years, original thinking will be what matters the most. AI might replace many jobs, but it cannot replace thinkers. Be alert all the time, and keep the creative spark alive in yourself. Thank you so much!

Korean: The Rising Star of International Language

"Korean Goes Global: Exploring the Spread of Hallyu and 한글 (Hangeul)"

Language is one of the most important parts of our life. Every time we require languages to express ourselves. Learning language is a great skill and experience in our life. Just like me being engaged into learning a new language 'KOREAN'. No matter how much difficult it is, we should try to learn new things.

Learning Korean language is a difficult task. The grammar is very complex to be understood. This article is not in Korean language because I'm still learning it. But there are some words that I know well.

The Korean language has:

- Hangul: It is the Korean writing system having 10 basic vowels and 14 basic consonants.
- Grammar: The grammar is characterized by its SUBJECT OBJECT VERB (S-O-V) word order.
- Particles: Common particles include subject markers (이/가), object markers (을/를), topic markers (은/는), and location markers (에/에서), among others.
- Sentence Structure: Korean sentences are structured differently from English. In addition to the SOV word order, they often begin with the topic or a contextual phrase, followed by the subject, object, and verb.

Korean language is gradually changing the mindset of people and increasing its followers across the world. It has introduced its famous Korean pop (K-Pop) culture which is fascinating people all around. It has introduced some of its legendary groups/bands as BTS, Black Pink, TXT, Seventeen etc. This culture is leading Korea to put more steps ahead for fame. These efforts have encouraged people to look forward for learning new about their language and millions of followers know many words that are common for the native Koreans but new and interesting for the learners. Like- annyeonghaseyo (hello), gamsahabnida (thank you), nae jasin (myself), imnida (to be) and so on. It has been changing the scenario of the world and taking its place.

Korea's efforts has made its KOREAN LANGUAGE popular and beneficial socially, economically and emotionally too as people are connecting to them.
