New Beginnings: First Assembly for The Session 2024-25 (Classes VI To XII)



India's Economic Rise: Set to Overtake China as Global Growth Engine by 2080

India's stock market is thriving as a result of foreign investment and trade agreements, attracting global manufacturing giants such as Boeing and Apple. However, India's \$3.5 trillion economy is still \$17.8 trillion behind China's, and economists believe it will take a lifetime to catch up due to its poor infrastructure and a shortage of skilled workers . Bloomberg Economics predicts India could surpass China by 2028 as the world's largest GDP contributor. This could be achieved by improving factories, cities, labor skills, and infrastructure. The administration aims to attract Western companies to diversify operations and source labor at a lower cost. However, concerns about China's dominance in supply chains and sensitive technology have ended the "miracle" phase of China's economic boom.

For the fiscal year 2024–2025, the Indian government has upped its infrastructure allocation to around ₹11 lakh crore; if states' spending is taken into account, it may potentially reach ₹20 lakh crore. Incentives such as tax exemptions, reduced land prices, and capital provided to Indian industries have been put in place by the government to promote domestic manufacturing. By the end of the decade, India's GDP is expected to rise to 9%, surpassing China as the world's greatest growth driver by 2028, according to Bloomberg Economics. The only nation with a sizable population that can take the place of China and the advanced economies' retiring manufacturing workers is India. China and other major economies will retire 48.6 million medium skilled workers between 2020 and 2040, whereas India will add 38.7 million of these workers.





The eclipse brought daytime darkness to North America



Yesterday, millions of people flocked outside to witness the startling, disconcerting magic of daylight darkness over North America. The eclipse's path, which passed through parts of eastern Canada, the United States, and central and northern Mexico, is home to about 32 million people. Many more drove to see it, boosting the economy in some of the country's most rural areas. The temperature fell when the corona's silvery brightness became visible. The celestial show was welcomed with clapping and cheers at some watch parties. (I observed at a Brooklyn Park that was packed with thousands of people. Many people started to celebrate when the sun was fully obscured.)

Veterans of eclipse viewing along the Mississippi River agreed that it was an even better show. Jonathan Bish, a Frederick, Missouri resident who witnessed the 2017 total eclipse, remarked, "It was definitely darker than entirely distinct "An experience. "Years of preparation and anticipation came to a magnificent realisation when the eclipse passed over Houlton, Maine, a town in the path of totality. Couples embraced by putting their arms over one other's shoulders as the sun began to set. Three minutes passed as if time had stopped, and suddenly the sunlight came back too fast. "If I could see that again, I would pay a million dollars," Houlton resident Sebastian Pelletier11 remarked. In the 48 contiguous states of the United States and Canada, the next chance to witness a total solar eclipse is in 2044.

Tesla Eyes India For Electric Vehicle Manufacturing As Demand Grows And Regulations Favor Evs



"All vehicles will go electric, it's just a matter of time," he stated. Musk, who also owns platform X, thinks that India would follow other nations in embracing electric vehicles (EVs). Tesla is looking for land for a manufacturing unit in India.

The news comes just a week after a media report claimed that Tesla would send a team to India later this month to scout locations for a proposed electric car plant. This team will concentrate on states with automotive hubs, such as Maharashtra, Gujarat, and Tamil Nadu. The plant is expected to be worth between \$2 billion and \$3 billion. The Indian government has announced plans to reduce import taxes on certain electric vehicles for companies that invest at least \$500 million. This move may benefit Tesla, as EV demand slows and competition heats up in its US and Chinese markets.

In July last year, the company said it was interested in building a factory in India to produce an EV priced at \$24,000 (approx. Rs 20 lakh).

The Saviour Stick also has water sensor that detect water ahead and produce sound. They taught us that the first step is to emphasize that means to go to people and ask what problems they have. then make a solution. If we need to solve a question in one hour. We should understand the problem in 55 mins and write the solution in remaining 5 mins. Many students had amazing and unique ideas. They also conducted activities that were amazing. I loved them. The session was over at 5:30 pm. We went to ideate lab, mercedes lab etc with them. We had our dinner from 8 pm till 9 pm in the hostel mess. The food was good. The girls had to stay in the guest House and the boys in boys hostel. The hostel was not that good. Egg and tomato wraps Sambhavi, X-C

Ingredients:

- Cheese
- Chives or Parsley
- 2 eggs, cooked
- Tomato slices
- Black pepper

- Breakfast, Starter/snack, Main meal

- Prep time: 5 minutes (assuming eggs are already cooked)

Instructions:

- 1.Spread one side of each tortilla wrap with soft cheese. Sprinkle with snipped chives or parsley (if using).
- 2.Remove and discard shells from eggs, then slice. Arrange egg slices and rocket leaves across the middle of each wrap.
- 3. Top with tomato slices and season with black pepper.
- 4. Wrap/fold or loosely roll up tortilla wraps to enclose filling; cut each into 3 or 4 portions. Serve immediately.


CULTURE OF INDIA

India falls 2-4 to Australia in Men's hockey Test Match Clash

Indian men's hockey team loses 2-4 to Australia in second Test match of five-game series. In a back-and-forth battle, Australia's Jeremy Hayward (6', 34'), Jacob Anderson (42'), and Nathan Ephraums (45') scored, while India's Jugraj Singh (9') and Captain Harmanpreet Singh (30') found the net. India showed promising passing and breached Australia's defense early, but Hayward's penalty corner put Australia ahead. Jugraj Singh equalized with a penalty corner, and Harmanpreet Singh's precision shot gave India a halftime lead. Australia rallied in the third quarter, with Hayward and Anderson scoring to regain the lead. Ephraums' goal extended Australia's lead to 4-2 before the end of the quarter.
