While the World Catches Up to 5G, China Has Launched 10G introduced 10G

China leads in next-generation internet services, with its 10G network offering download rates of 10,000 Mbps, enabling users to download a 20GB 4K movie in less than 20 seconds. Despite US measures preventing tech progress, such as tariffs on EVs and solar equipment, and preventing access to innovative semiconductors, China continues to dominate the market in this emerging technology. In Africa and India, 4G is the most widely used standard, and 5G adoption is still in its infancy. Only 25% of mobile customers worldwide are on 5G as of April 2025, and even 5G-Advanced is just beginning to take off. In 2024, 74% of mobile connections were in Latin America, compared to just 17% in Sub-Saharan Africa. North America has only attained 77% 5G adoption, whereas Southeast Asia had a 39.2% acceptance rate. China's 10G network, which is only available in a few places, is a preview of a future in which real-time big data powers telemedicine, virtual schools, and agribusiness.



US-China Trade Tensions Update



New reports from the IMF and US Federal Reserve highlight growing concerns over global economic uncertainty driven by US-China trade tensions. The IMF's latest World Economic Outlook warns that escalating tariffs and unpredictable policies are weakening both short-term and long-term growth prospects, with global growth forecasts being sharply downgraded. The US Fed's Beige Book similarly notes that while overall economic activity was little changed, business sentiment worsened in many regions due to fears around tariffs. Consumer spending, especially on non-automobile goods, also showed signs of slowing. In China, businesses are adapting by planning small-scale factories in the US to bypass tariffs, while the Chinese government is exploring possible exemptions on essential imports from the US, although no decisions have been announced yet. The world now watches as the 90-day pause on President Trump's tariffs approaches its July deadline, with high uncertainty over future trade actions.

India Launches Operation Sindoor After Pahalgam Terror Attack; Global Support Follows



On April 22, 2025, a brutal terrorist attack in Pahalgam's Baisaran Valley left 26 dead and over 20 injured, including Indian and Nepali tourists. In response, India launched Operation Sindoor, a multi-day military campaign targeting terror camps in Pakistan and PoK linked to Jaishe-Mohammed and Lashkar-e-Taiba.India also suspended the Indus Waters Treaty, expelled Pakistani diplomats, and closed border crossings.

Pakistan retaliated by suspending the Simla Agreement and closing its airspace. The Indian Army and Navy demonstrated strategic strength, with missile strikes and naval deployment in the Arabian Sea. Meanwhile, countries like the U.S. and Malaysia expressed strong support for India's actions, while the global community urged restraint and dialogue.

Delhi Records Highest Day Temperature In April In 3 Years



On Sunday, the IMD predicts partly overcast skies with strong winds. Delhi saw its highest April day temperature in the previous three years on Saturday, reaching 42.1 degrees Celsius.The highest recorded temperature was 43.5 degrees Celsius in 2022, the last time such a high was noted. 20.7 degrees Celsius was the average nighttime temperature. In contrast, the Ridge's high temperature was 43 degrees Celsius. Cool winds and a partly cloudy sky brought some relief to the metropolis in the evening. On Sunday, the IMD predicts partly overcast skies with strong winds.

In the Time of Conflict, Time to Say with One Voice:

Nation First!

I often enjoy sitting quietly in my office, sipping hot cup of tea, watching senior students laugh, chatter, play mischief in the corridors. Viewing such candid moments is the most blissful part of my day. However, of late, something has changed. These activities are still continuing. Children are oblivious to the clouds darkening each day, these children – innocent, hopeful, full of dreams – have no idea of the looming shadow that the Indo-Pak war threat casts over us all. Today roles have changed. Today I cannot just remain a Vice Principal or a woman, or a mother, or a teacher. Today above all, my most important role is that of a citizen of this great nation. And dear Readers, I feel the urgent need to speak – to share what has long remained unspoken in the depths of my conscience. The winds of conflict are unsettling. The murmurs of war might seem distant for now, but the moods are already grim and in times like these, it is no longer enough to talk about nation-building in abstract terms. It is time to act – **decisively, and with unity!** I am a proud wife of an Air Force officer. For me patriotism does not happen on Independence Day or the Republic Day. For me Patriotism is not reserved for the battlefield either. Patriotism runs in the family; it runs in our veins. Ideally, it should begin in classrooms, in homes, in everyday decisions. As educators, parents, and responsible citizens, we must teach our children what it truly means to love their country. It's not just about saluting the flag or singing the anthem after every school event – it's about sacrifice, unity, and making choices that benefit the nation before us. I intend to make



patriotism part of our school culture. Let students write essays on real-life heroes, not just memorize dates. Let them engage in discussions about integrity, service, and national pride. Let our morning assemblies echo not just with prayer, but also with pledges of commitment to our country. Largely, we have succeeded in our ideas too but not enough. We need to act in a bigger way!! In this critical hour, every rupee spent is a statement of intent. We must understand that our economy is as much a part of our national defence as our armed forces are. It pains me to see the markets flooded with foreign – especially Chinese – products, when our own artisans and vendors struggle to survive. By buying Chinese goods, we empower the very systems that may one day stand against us. This is not mere rhetoric - it is a harsh reality. We must awaken. We must become Vocal for Local. From the pencil cases in our students' bags to the decorations in our homes, let us make a conscious shift. Support the local toy maker, the neighbourhood craftsman, the Indian manufacturer. Let every purchase we make, be a vote for our country. It's time to shake everyone out of their slumber. This is not a fight for soldiers alone. It is a test for all of us. Our love for the nation must reflect in the choices we make daily. Let's have honest conversations with our children about current events. Let's replace the obsession with imported brands with pride in Made in India. Let us make a sincere effort to promote swadeshi goods and discourage the use of foreign items. But my pain does not end with this. There is much more to ponder over...... Whenever there is a war like situation or geopolitical conflicts shadow us, often hear people say things like, "I am an artist; I have nothing to do with war," or "I am a writer, a thinker – wars are not my concern as I see no boundaries." And every time I hear such words, I feel aghast. Yes, artists are connected globally through their art. Writers share ideas that transcend borders. Teachers preach Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam i.e. the world is one family. All of this is beautiful and true. But I ask, my grand family: India!! Who shall fight for our motherland? Are we okay to let go of a piece of our motherland? Let Kashmir go away and then what.... Punjab? Then the Seven- Sisters?? Are we okay to cut our motherland into pieces?? No?? Then, who shall save our mother land? Only the soldiers? Is war only the burden of those in uniform? What about us — the ordinary citizens, the educators, the creators, the consumers? Are we not hiding behind lofty ideals and global identities just to stay comfortable, to avoid discomfort, to remain in our cocoon and not feel disturbed? Our enemy is not just at the border; it lurks in contentment, in ignorance, in divided loyalties. But I believe in the spirit of India. The spirit of India cannot be dampened. We survived against all odds earlier and we shall survive now too. I believe in our children, our people, our courage. As a Vice Principal, I may not hold a rifle today, but I hold a pen. — and with it, I hope to ignite thought, responsibility, and change.





PM Modi Inaugurates Khelo India Youth Games 2025; Rajasthan Wins First Gold

Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated the 7th Khelo India Youth Games on May 4, 2025, via videoconference, praising young athletes as symbols of determination. The event is being held across five cities in Bihar.Rajasthan's Prachi and Mayank Choudhary won the first gold in the 10m air pistol mixed team event, narrowly defeating Uttar Pradesh 17-15. Delhi claimed bronze by beating Haryana 16-14.

Rajasthan's Prachi and Mayank Choudhary secured the first gold medal of the Khelo India Youth Games (KIYG) 2025 in Bihar, triumphing in a nail-biting 10m air pistol mixed team final against Uttar Pradesh at the Dr. Karni Singh Shooting Range on Monday.

With the score level at 15-15, it all came down to the final shot. Prachi, calm and focused, delivered a near-flawless 10.6 to seal the victory for Rajasthan over Uttar Pradesh's Dev Pratap and Urva Chaudhary.
